Eleventh Annual Report: 1942-43

The present report gives a brief review of the Institute's activities in the eleventh year of its evistence. Inspire of the general difficulties under was conditions which took a rather pronounced form during the year under review, work was continued on more or less normal libes.

THE SIXTH SEASION OF THE INDIAN STATISTICAL CONVENENCE, CALCUTA 1943.

The Conference was opened on 4th January 1943 at 4 P.M. in the Darbhunga Hall of the Calcutta University by Dr. B. C. Roy, Vice Chancellor of the University, who road out a movings received from the Patron of the Conference, His Excellency the Governor of Bengal. The Governor in his message stressed the importance of statistics in planning which he said is the password to progress and wished the delogates creative success in the impending debates and a bright future for statistical science itself. Dr. Roy as Chairman of the Reception Committee welcoming the delegates referred to the fact that the Calcutta University was the first in India to have recognised the need for a separate post-graduate department in statistics which had been established in July, 1941, and as Vice-Chancellor of the University he was happy to note the very close association which had been established between the University and the Statistical Laboratory. The Hon'ble Mr. N. R. Sarker, Member in charge of the Departments of Food & Commerce. Covernment of India, in his Providential address urged a better appreciation of the need for accurate statletics in this country and he referred to his own difficulties as Food Member in striking a balance among contflicting interests arising out of urgant domand for goods in short supply and in retaining equitable distribution of the available supply on the basis of insufficient statistical material. After the presidential address Prof. P. C. Mahalagobia, Hony. Secretary, presented an annual review of the activities of the Indian Statistical Institute

The first arientific meeting of the Sixth Conference was held on January 4th, 1942, jointly with the section of Mathematics and Statistics of the Indian Science Congress with Prof. F. W. Levi in the cluor. Prof. B. K. Sarkar opened the discussion on Tosching of Statistics and Mathematics in which Dr. H. Sinha, Mr. R. C. Boec, Dr. Chandra Sckar, Mr. Y. S. Tu, Prof. F. W. Levi and Prof. P. C. Mahalanobis tools parti-

On the 5th January, 1943, there was a morning session on the-vertical statutes provided over by Mr. R. C. Bosec. Mr. K. R. Nair opened a discussion on Design of Experiments in which Dr. Chandlas Schat Mr. C. R. Rao and Mr. R. C. Bose took part. In the exempt there was a session of applie + statutics prouded over by Prof. B. K. Sorkar. Prof. Sarkar opening the discussion spoke at length on the need of applied statistics in any scheme for planning and re-construction. A prolonged discussion followed in which Prof. Mahalanobis, Mr. A. R. Sinha, Mr. J. M. Dutt, Mr. J. Guha Thakurtha, Mr. M. P. Srivastava, and Dr. H. Sinha participated.

THEORETICAL RESEARCHES.

Theoretical researches were continued on three main topics: (1) measures of statistical divergences with appropriate exact distributions: (2) design and analysis of experiments; (3) design of large-scale sample surveys together with model sampling experiments on non-random fields. The third subject received a good deal of attraction expectally to connexion with the development of an efficient technique for crop-ceilinating surveys.

Di-Statutic: Work was continued under the guidance of S. N. Roy who worked out the individual sampling distributions, on the null and non-null hypotheses of pessatistics (introduced by hun for purpose of discrimination in respect of manages and co-variance) between two multi-variate normal populations, or in respect of mean values between k multivariate normal populations supposed to have the same set of variances and co-variances), the juint distribution of these pratitives having been already worked out and published by him in the privious year.

Work is also proceeding (6. N. Roy and P. K. Bose) on the construction of suitable tables for the relevant incomplete probability integrals under the guidance of P. C. Mahalanchus. It may be mentioned here that Mahalanchia' Generalised Distance has found suitable application in a rice experiment at Banhura.

Problems of Distribution: Serveral more problems on the multi-variate distributions were worked out by S. N. Roy and P. K. Bose. The distribution of the ratio of the two variates of a bi-variate normal population has been worked out. Tables have also been constructed for confluent hypergrometric series for various values of the argument, under the guidance of P. C. Mahakanobis.

Durjon of Experiments: Further progress has been achieved in the mathematical theory of the design and analysis of experiments by R. C. Bose, K. R. Nair and C. R. Rao. The conditions for the resolvability of balanced incomplete block designs were discovered; certain inequality relationships among combinatorial parameters of incomplete block designs were established. A new class of incomplete block designs or inter and intra-group comparisons for several groups of varieties of a scorp was found out. Consistently-progress was made in the technique of extracting inter-block information for partially balanced in complete block dosigns. The measure of improvement in the precision of biological experiments which can be attained by adjustments for concomitant characters has also been activated.

Design of Stample Stareaus: There types of problems emerged directly or indirectly out of certain large-scale sample surveys entructed to the indian Statistical Institute and conducted by it during the period 1937.4.1 The problems relate to the formulation of a proper sampling design for estimating with maximum precision for a given cost, (i) the proportion of land under a particular crop or crops, (ii) the yield per unit area of a particular crop and (iii) the geographical distribution of the crop user a particular area in respect footh proportion of land under the crop and yield per unit area. In the technical language used here the problems are those of (i) area survey, (ii) yield survey and (iii) mapping survey. The experience of the last few years has enabled P. C. Mahalanobis to reach a fairly comprehensave solution of (i) the area problem, both in the alestract as well as in the concrete, and a partial solution of (ii) yield survey, mostly in the alestract. With regard to (iii) mapping survey, week is in progress.

SPECIAL ENQUERIES AND PROJECTS.

Jule area survey: 1941 was the first year when a Jule Consus was taken on an all provincial scale with completely statisfactory results, the margin of error being less than three per cent. The Indian Central Jute Committee recommended continuance of the sample survey by the Government of Bengal, which, however, took a good deal of time in reaching a decision. The properatory work for a provincial survey usually takes at least four months but Government instructions to proceed with the survey which had to start early in May came so late as the 26th of March 1942. By the time most of the trained staff bud been disbanded so that the field work in 1942 had to be carried out by investigators with no previous training or experience, with unhappy results. The mount and touch for the area survey was Rs. 1,00,000 and for crop-cutting experiments Rs. 18,000, the total falling short by Rs. 6,000 of the estimate submitted by the Honorary Secretary, and the programme of the work had to be modified accordingly. A grant of Rs. 22,000 was sanctioned by the Covernment of Bengal in August 1942 for tabulating the area figures for aux paddy and sugarcane, data on which we had already collected in the course of the field survey of the jute crop-Owing to the delay in Covernment deciding to continue the sample survey in 1842 we had to use the design employed in 1941 having no time for working out a new one in the light of our experience of 1941. This meant a break in the continuous advancement of technique from year to year which had been effected since 1937.

A preliminary estimate of the area under jute was submitted to Government on the 9th September 1942, just about a week after receiving the last set of field records. After detailed serutiny of the records it was, however, discovered that much of the primary insterial was suspicious. As a matter of fact, a good portion of the primary material reflected in 1942 field to be thrown away so to say, because they were found into his properties of the superpotential properties were not found to fally. This merely shows that it is not possible to secure reliable material by employing untrinsed and unselected primary investigators. As area survey: Some of the primary materials of the sus survey had to be rejocted as in the case of jute but after proper adjustment it was found that our sample estimate was on the whole about 20 per cosh in excess of the official forceast, and the suggestion was put forward by the Honorary Scenetary that the official forceast for the province as a whole should be corrected from 82-5 lakks of acres to 75 lakhs of acres to 7

July rep-cating 1 Reperimental work was continued in 1942 on jute evop-cutting and considerable activance was made on the statistical side, but the human factor in organisation needs immediate attention. The mean yield figures indeed were not found to be fully reliable in the light of the various cross-checks (including half-sampling) we employed. No real progress can be made until we succeed in organising a trained staff, a point strongly emphasized by Prof. R. A. Fisher in the memorandum which be submitted to H. E. the Vicerous as early as in 1938.

Are crop-culting: Yield figures for any paddy were collected for 1 districts and on the basis of these it has been found that the official normal yield figure for those districts would require a revision downwards of 18 per cent in 1942.

Supercase area survey: 1 At the request of Government of Beagal we tabulated the area figures for supercase. Our estimate of the total area under supercase in Bongal in 1942 was 202,000 acress against an official forecast of 303,000 acress.

Fixed and Supercome: United Provinces 1942-4: This was the third year of this scheme. The field work of two measons has been completed and the statistical analysis of the material collected is pre-cedine. The design for what ought to have been the final year's work was propared embodying improvements based on the first two years' work. The field work was, however, postponed at the last moment, as the Covernment of the United Provinces was anable to spare the necessary staff beauses of argent was-work.

Amon Paddy: Burdens-Hoopkly-Howesh Irrigation area: A preliminary report on the work during 1938-39, 1933-40 and 1940-41 was submitted to the Government of Bengal in September 1942. The field work for the season 1942-43 was carried out in accordance with the design prepared in the Statistical Laboratory. Analysis of the material not included in the preliminary report (1938-41) is proceeding. It may be mentioned bere that this is partly at yield and partly a mapping survey.

Circhoso Nurray 1841-42: There were two adherons, a report on one of which, as mentioned in last year's Annual Report, had been submitted in 1841-42. A report was prepared during the year on the other scheme which related to six different age-groups of sinchons plants.

U. P. Authropometry 1842-43: This is a project relating to the analysis of certain anthropometric data collected by Dr. D. Majumdar of Lucknow University in connexion with 1941 Canusa, and is being financed jointly by the Government of India (Home Department) and the Indian Statistical Institute. Work on the scheme is progressing satisfactorily; and mean values, standard deviations, and coefficients of variation for 15 characters for 25 casto-groups have already become not to Dr. Mazumdar.

Brogal Lobour Enquiry 1840.42: The Bengal Labour Enquiry entrasted to the Institute as mentioned in last year's Annual Report had to be discontinued for lack of funds with offeet from 5th May, 1942. Altogether since November 1940, a total of 3655 labour family budgets had been collected. A Draft Report on 573 budgets collected at Jagoddal in the first instance had been submitted in November 1941 but no instructions had been received in this regard shows them. A note on the precision of the nurvey was submitted in July 1942 in respect of the first sample at Jagoddal and the Honorary Secretary is gird to report that the primary object of the Institute in lating up the enquiry, viz. devising a suitable statistical technique for such socio-exconnic surveys has been gashered to a very large extrus.

Nespur Labour Expuiry: The work of collecting 897 family budgets in Nespur under the technical guidance of the Honorary Secretary was completed by the Labour Office of the Government of Central Provinces; and Mr. M. P. Bhirvastava of the Labour Office, Ngapur cense to Calculta some time age with the primary material. The analysis of the material has been completed and a report is to be submitted shortly to the C. P. Government.

Regional Survey of Borov Peats of Supercans 1940-41: As reported last year, the data in this scheme are being analysed with the help of a grant from the Imperial Council of Agricultural Research. The analysis is nearing completion, the grant having been increased in response to a request by the Honorary Secretary, owing to the rise in costs under war conditions.

Astrological Research: In 1941 a Sample Survey had about that roughly two-thirds of middle class families in Calcutta possessed horocoopes and that about one-third of the persons interviewed had faith in astrological forecasts. In view of such wide-spread belief in astrology, in May 1942 a series of studies were taken up to find out how astrological forecasts faced in infant mortality oses. Dates and times of births etc. of babies obtained from a Maternity Hospital in Calcutta were given to two getrologen who were saked to find out how many and which of the babies would due within a first-night. Data regarding deaths were kept absolutely accret. The perdictions of the astrologen were taken in respect of 500 child-birth cases and the material is being statistically analysed.

STATISTICAL ENQUIRIES.

As small a large number of enquiries from all parts of India was attended to during the year under review. The distribution by subjects and by administration regions of the more important enquires it given below :—

STATISTICAL LIBRARY.

As already reported last year the bulk of the Library has been executed to Giridih for the drustion of the present emergency. The library is functioning as Giridih normally, though ungent local business keeping most of the workers at Calcutta and Baranagores and the University Department of Statistics functioning now at Calcutta involved frequent requisitioning here of books from Giridih. The general policy however continues to be to keep as few books in Calcutta and Baranagore as is consistent with the urgent needs of our rewards not other workers.

The number of books purchased during the year was 145 and the number received for review in Sankhya was 20. Inspite of the war we are receiving now 173 annuals and 250 periodicals appearing new than once a year. The number of volumes issued on lean or for reference during the year was 2231 (as against 2038 in 1941-12) owing mainly to the built of the Library having been differ to Giridit.

The Library is keeping in eutority a loan collection of 3000 books valued at Ra. 20 000 bolonging to the Honorary Secretary and of 100 volumes valued at Ra. 1,500 bolonging to Frof. K. B. Madhava. The Council in its meeting of the 9th October 1942 suggested that these collections should be made over to the Institute as gifts on condition that special funds of Ra. 20,000 and Rs. 1,500 respectively would be built up for disbursers out by the Council in consultation with Professors Mahalusobia and Madhava respectively, who would also retain the right to be serve shad now such of all the books belonging to their collection.

TRAINING WORK AND EXAMINATIONS.

Owing to Calcutta I ring a danger area those were many officers who gave up the idea of roming from the putation; 3 hourver joined at Giridii, where special efforts were made to open up training facilities. Mr. K. R. Nair continued to be in charge of this section and altogether 6 officers from Assam, Bengal, Bihar, Madrex and Sind came on deputation to the Institute for statistical training, and in a delition these were 7 officers from Bengal and U. F. who came for exentitie committations and discussions (Appendix 2). As regards the standard training course run by the Institute, though we had to restrict admissions due to the present emergency, there were 4 advanced students in addition to 3 appendices for professional training (Appendix 3).

Institute Examinations in Statistics: In spite of the difficulties under war conditions arrangements were used to hold the Computer's Certificate examinations simultaneously in Calcutts and Giridii stating from 7th October 1942. At the last moment the candidates wanted a refund of their few on the piece of

various difficulties which could not be entertained. Earlie however, Mr. O. O. Gools of Delhi had come and ant for a special examination which he passed surconsidily. The Board of Examiners for the year consisted of Professor K. B. Masilatva, Marver, R. C. Bose, S. N. Roy and K. R. Nair and Prof. P. C. Mahahandhia. It is proposed to hold the Statistician's Diploma and Computer's Certificate examinations during the monaton term.

INSTITUTE STATE.

The work of the Laboratory was carried on as usual on a unitary basis, though grants were relevined from different sources for various projects as in pervious years. As reported last year in response to recommendations usuals by the Honorary Secretary, two scales of pay Ra. 33-478 and Rs. 50-5-100 had been introduced by the Council for the lower paid workness of the Laboratory. In September, 1912, however, it appeared that there was a possibility of the Institute's receipts dropping appreciably in case the just survey and certain other whenever serve not mosted. In this situation the Council decided to serve two months' motive to all workers. This development brought to ight the inherent instability of the present instancial position of the Institute. The Homorary Secretary had made repeated presentations at Delhi and elewhere for some form of stabilisation in the interests as much of the scientific value of the Institute's work as those of the workers whose position was extremely linearure. Fortunately, however, the crois was tided over without any drestic retren-hosed owing to the Government of India continuing the special non recurring grant of Rs. 20,000 which they had paid in 1841-42. Also early in 1842 is was infermally undendood that the Government of Beegal would continue the Jute and Aus Survey that year, and it was also made known that the I. C. A. R. scheme which would have terminated by 31st March 1843 according to previous stivices would be continued for another six months. Every peachl-cifort is brung made by the Hunorary Secretary to achieve a text of permanent status for the Institute, though it is feared that for a considerable time yet the present insecurity would have to be cultival.

Sanar-indra Nath Roy was appointed whole-time fecturer on a temporary basis in the Calcutta University, Department of Statisties; and Jitendra Molian Sengupta and Furnendu Kumar Bose were appointed part time Demonstrators in the University Department, P. V. Krahasmurthy, B.A.(Andhra), B. Hamnarayana, M.S., (Cal), K. K., Mathen M.A. (Molras), M. M. Mukherjo M.A. (Cal), S. Daserjee M.A. (Cal.), and M. N. Choch M.A.(Cal.), joined the Institute during the year under review as technical apparatices. Also of the 9 apportances and training students shown in Appendix 4, three, B. Sicar, V. Rama Chaulers Bao and N. R. Rama Subramaniam were appointed technical apprentices during the year.

Pallocation and Scholmships: Applications for followings and scholarships varying in value from Rs. 80 to Rs. 100 to Rs.

During the year under review a Chineso student, Mr. Y. S. Tu, M.A. (Econ.) of the National Tring Hua University of China came down to India as a Research Pollor of the Institute in accordance with an arrangement through Dr. P. 1. How of the Poking University now stated in Kunning.

Mr. Tu is working on a comparative study of agricultural contomics and database in China and India.

Provident Fund: A Provident Fund was put into operation in January 1941 with a basic contribution of one anna in the rupes from the workers and an equal contribution from the employers. In view of the uncertainty of the financial position steps are being taken, however, to restrict admission to the scheme to what may be called the nuclear staff.

LOCAL BRANCERS OF THE INSTITUTE.

In some of the branches of the Institute work was carried on as in previous years; in some, however, work unavoidably suffered owing to the repercussions of the war.

BOMBAY BRANCE

The Annual General Meeting of the Branch was held on the 22nd July, 1942 for the election of the office-beavers and Committee members. Sir H. M. Mehta, Ku, K.B.E. continued to be the President of the Branch. It was infinally to carry on the normal activities owing to the unsettled state in the city and the precoccupation of the necesbers with other presenting duties.

DELMI BRANCH

In pursance of the resolution adopted at the fifth session of the Indian Statistical Conference, halid at Baroda in January 1942, the Branch was organised and started from 1st of May, 1942. Mr. N. R. Barker (then Member of the Viceowy's Executive Outsuie)) kindly consented to act as the President, Dr. P. V. Bakhatme, Statistics of the Importal Council of Agricultural Research as the Treasurer, and Mr. O. R. Seth of Illinda College, Delhi as the Secretary. Two business meetings and three ordinary meetings were held at which the following bectures were delivered; 1) Survey of Labour Statistics in India totaly: by Mr. 8. Subramanian, Statistician to the Economic Advisor to the Government of India (2) War Finance and Indian Economy: by Dr. V. K. R. V. Rao of the University of Delhi: and (3) On Estimation of Crop Yields by Dr. V. G. Banes, Statistician, Institute of Plant Industry, Indoce.

MADRAS BRANCH

As most of the Government Departments were removed from Madras city on account of the war attuation it was not possible to carry on the usual activities of the Branch. As usual, work was carried on in active collaboration with the Economics Department of the University of Madras. Dr. N. Sundars Rama Sastry continued to be the Secretary of the Branch. Prof. P. J. Thomas, the President of the Branch has been appointed Director of Recearch, New India Planning Group, Government of India.

MYSORE BRANCH

The Branch worked in collaboration with the departments of Statistics, Economies and Psychology of the University of Mysore. Work was greatly disturbed by the abnormal conditions in the country. Two meetings were held in which the current literature from statistical periodicals was discussed. The computational and reporting work was carried on without much interruption. Prof. Madhava who was analyzing fertility statistics of marriages for the Mysore Cenaus published his findings in the Report of the Mysore Cenaus. [94].

POONA BRANCH

A large number of workers in the local educational institutions were closely associated with the work of the Branch; and a number of statistical problems were taken up for study by informal references and formal discussions. Professors Galipli and Karve organised a survey of the economic resources of Sangis, an Indian State, by the sample and group enquiry method; the cost for conducting the survey was small and the results were prunsing. An interesting paper on some eigenveloc modifications in the Proportional Representative Scheme was result by Mr. S. W. Ranche of Norgur.

LUCKNOW BRANCH

A number of interesting papers were read during the last sersion. Dr. Radhakantal Mukherjee read a paper on the criterian for fixing the minimum living wages for industrial operatives in I tota; the advocated a corrolation of wages to the movements of rost of fixing induses on the basis of minimum requirements. Mr. Shitla Prased Sakseau read a paper on the limitations of the index numbers for measuring the movements in the cost of living. Mr. Raj Narain read a paper on efficiency texts and defects in the presson system of examinations. On each occasion, the reading of the papers was followed by lively discussions:

SANKHYA: THE INDIAN JOURNAL OF STATISTICS.

Two issues of the Journal were published during the year. The Monotype machine the bill for which had been fully paid as reported last year has been found to be of considerable help in the matter of typographical arrangements, though the soute shortage of paper which we are experiencing may compel us to discontinue publishing the Journal if the war continues too long. We have however enough paper for another four or five issues of the Journal, thanks to our baving built up a stock when there was still an opportunity

for it. The amount of Rs. 5294-4-0 which was still outstanding at the end of the year 1941-42 out of the original advance of Rs. 9,000 made by the Honorary Secretary in his personal capacity on the Monotype Machine secount was repaid during the year under review.

EVACUATION ARRANGEMENTS.

As already reported has year, the Institute is having three offices during the present emergency, ast Baranagore, Calcutta and Giridin. The general poliny is to keep as little as possible of our books and equipments in the danger area. Is is presumed that Giridin is the safest of all the three places, and Calcutta the most dangerous. Baranagore coming in between. Owing to the reigencies of work, records, books, and equipments have indeed to be moved about between the three offices involving considerable problems of co-ordination which, however, are being attended to in more or less matificatory manner.

Construction work has been almost completed at Baranagore and is nearing completion at Giridih.
Considerable additional space has been obtained by the Institute without any payment of rent for office
work, for safe keeping of Institute records, books, and equipments as well as for boosing Institute workers
both at Baranagore and Giridih. The arrangements as Olridih were personally looked into by the President,
the Horbib Mr. N. R. Sarker in December 1942.

The Council devices in its meeting of the 9th March, 1942 to have a separate account for construction, repeir and useintenance in respect of the two houses Amphali (Baranagoro) and Mahua (Biridib), placed at the duponal of the Institute for the present emergency by Prof. C. Mahlaanbia and Mrs. Mahulanolis, respectively. The owners of Amrapali and Mahua would also be entitled to retain all fixtures at the cod of the emergency on payment of such amount as the Council may then decide not exceeding the balance of expenditure incurred out of the General fund for construction, maintenance and repear.

Contributions in lieu of the services of the Honorary Secretary: A sum of Ra. 2,500 sanctioned as the fee of the Statistical Advisor for reop-cutting work on just (Indian Contral Just Committee letter No. 381/42 dated 24-242) was merged with the block grant to the Institute at the desire of the Hon. Secretary. Another sum of Ra. 9,000 sanctioned as fee for the just scheme (Overmann of Bangal letter No. 121-J., dated 26.2-43) was handed over to the Institute as desired by the Hon. Secretary. A grant of Ra. 2,500 was also directly paid to the Institute in lieu of the services of the Hon. Secretary in connexuon with crop-cutting work in the Burdwan-Hooghly-Howrah Irrigation area (Government of Bengal Memo. No. 272-J., dated 16-2-43).

MISCELLANEOUS.

Calcuta University Department of Statistics 1. The Calcuta University Department of Statistics, which had been opened in July. 1941 as reported last year with the Honorary Secretary as its Honorary Merch, has been functioning emosthly. In November, 1942, a new batch of students joined the fifth year classes, so that from that date there were both fifth and eirth year classes as in other established departments. Department is still located in the Statistical Laboratory and there has been no interruption in the close association certablished initially between the two organizations. Special classes were beld in the summer of 1942-13 at Giridih for the benefit of the students, but the Department has since come back to Calcuta and its work is going on satisfactority.

We are glad to note that a knighthood has been conferred on Dr. T. E. Gregory, who has for several years been a Vice-President of the Institute.

Calculation Machines: Owing to import restrictions the supply of calculating machines from abroad has practically osseed. The Hon. Secretary, therefore, submitted a tentative scheme to the Government of Bongol for manufacturing such instruments in India and saked for permission to act as huotrary technical advisor to a commercial concern which might be started for thus purpose. The Secretary, Educavation Department. informed him that the Covernment of Bengal was unable to do this as it would involve a reference to the Secretary of State for India (the Hon. Secretary being a permission member of the Indian Educational Service) and advised him to take up the work on a non-profit-making basis. Serious offorts are being made in this reveard.

Resolved that the estimates for 1942-14 as recommended by the Finance Committee be approved and the Finance Committee be authorized to make necessary medifications and comprehensions up to a limit of its, 10,000 in an inequation of confirmation by the Council. Also resolved that the Honorary Secretary is authorized to appoint crop survey and other workers for projects for a period not occeeding 3 months in anticipation of sanction by the Finance Committee or the Council of the Institute.

- (c) Finance Committee (1 year): The President, Dr. P. N. Bancejaa, Hany, Treasurer, Hony, Secretary, Mr. Haricharan Ghosh and Prof. K. N. Chakravarti (Convener).
- O. Provident Fund Arrangements: The Honorary Secretary stated that although all the workers of the Institute were appointed on a temporary basis the Conneil had started a Provident Fund with offect from January 1941. This was done in view of the fact that a scheme for the stabilization of the Institute with the help of t a permanent grant from the Government of India had been at that time under consideration by Government. No devision, however, had been made in this regard so far, and it was difficult to maintain provident fund arrangements on the existing scale. In this situation the Honorary Nevertary recommended certain stops being taken at an early date to reduce the committening to the Institute. He also stated that as two mentas notice torminating the services of all workers had been served on the lat October, 1942, and all workers were subsequently reappointed subject to termination of service on fifteen days notice, there was no legal difficulty in rearganzing the Provident Fund.
- (i) Resolved that the amount of Rs. 9,000 covering approximately the estimated liabilities of the famil as on 3 lst March, 1943, be separated from the General Fund and invested in mitable securities as early as possible.
- (ii) Resolved that the services of all workers be formally terminated not later than 30th May, 1943 and the Honorary Secretary be authorized to serve formal notice on all workers for this purpose; and that the workers be reappointed with effect from the 1st June 1943 in two classes of posts, namely (a) with and (b) without provident fund privileges.
- (iii) Resolved that the Finance Committee be requested to prepare a revised list of persons to be admitted to the Provident Fund in future in accordance with the amount of the annual grant from the Government of India.
- 1. Recommendations to the Institute: Standing Finance Committee: In view of the increasing financial responsibilities the Council recommends to the Institute that a Standing Finance Committee be not up and satisfied by a low to financial or this purpose.

- 10. Institute Accommodation: The Honorary Secretary reported that he had removed a good proportion of maps and records to the Baranagore Office and that about 50 persons were already working there. In case the achieve for the survey of unan paddy was reactioned by the Government of Bengal it would be necessary to increase office and store accountedation much further.
- Resolved that the Honorary Secretary be authorized to take necessary action of increasing office accetamendation at Baranagore or Giridib in case this breame necessary on account of further expansion of work.
- 11. Banking Accounts: The Honorary Socretary reported that as there were two offices of the Institute for the evergency at Ciridih and Baranagoro, in addition to the one at Presidency College, Calcruta, the business of the Institute would be facilitated if the Institute were to open banking accounts at Ciridih and Barnagore. In edition, it would also be desirable to have two accounts with Bengal Central Bank and Nath Bank at their Harrison Road Branches over the Prendency College office of the Institute.

Resolved that Banking Accounts for the Institute be opened with Bongel Central Bank, Harrison Road Branch, Calcutta; Nath Bank, Harrison Road Branch, Calcutta; Bengel Central Bank, Cr. in Branch, Giridhi; and Soburban Bank, Baranspore and that the said Banks be and are hereby authorised to honour cheques. Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes drawn, accepted or made on behalf of the Institute by either Prasenta Chandra Mahalanobis, Honorary Secretary of the Institute, or Khagendensath Chakravarti, Joing Hony, Secretary of the Institute and to act on any instructions to given relating to the secounts, whether the same be overdrawn or not, or relating to the transactions of the Institute

- 12. Coleculating Machinas: The Bonorary Secretary stated that he had already reported to the Council the difficulty enumed by the creatation of imports of calculating machines (item No.8 of Council Proceedings dated 12th February 1943). Since the meeting of the Council he had had further decreasions with Mr. Bottomley (then Director of Public Instructions, Bengal) and Mr. H. Grahma, LCS. (Secretary, Education Department, Bengal). Mr. Grahma ighia D.O. No. 1821-Educadated 13th March 1943 informed him that a reference to the Secretary of State for India would be necessary to give him permission to act as Hony. Technical Adviser to a commercial concern as he was a member of the Indian Educational Service and advised hum to take up the work on a non-profit making beaus. In view of the urgoury of the question he had already taken necessary action in this matter at his own personal risk and responsibility.
- Resolved that the Council places on record its approval of the action taken by Prof. P. C. Mehalanobia in his personal expacitly to under arrangements for repairing and constructing calculating machines in India. The Council is of opinion that it would be advisable to start a non-profit making society for this purpose. In case this was done the Council would be prepared to permit the Bionerary Secretary to be associated officially with the on-norm as its Humonary Technical Advisor and also to appoint an advisory committee to give all possible help and guidance in this matter provided the Institute was given priority as well as a concession in charges for service and purchase of calculating machines if the achemis tunned out to be successful.
