This is an advance summary of Agricultural Statistics of India, Vol. I, in which summary figures relating to the first four tables of the larger volume are given by provinces only.

Two charts illustrating (1) total uncultivable area, net area sown, cultivable waste other than fallow, and current fallows; (2) total area under food-crops, total area under non-tood crops, and total area of crops irricated.

This is mainly a summary of the final fore-casts of crops issued during each season. Estimated area and yield of rice, wheat, sugarcane, tea, cotton, jute, linseed rape and mustard, sesamum, groundnut, castor, indigo, coffee, and rubber together with the average yield per acre of each of these crops in each province. Estimated area and yield of certain other important crops, viz., barley, jowar, bajra, maize, gram and tobacco for which forecasts are not prepared given in supplementary tables. These statistics are shown separately for British India and Indian States from this issue. Statements showing the actual and normal rainfall in each province.

Information relating to important crops in foreign countries is also shown in a series of tables. Five appendices containing (I) methods of framing estimates of crops; (II) methods of collecting the statistics province by province; (III) summary of the seasonal or other conditions affecting prices of food grains, etc., in each quinquennium from 1861-65; (IV) dates on or about which the All-India forecasts of crops are issued; and (V) season of sowing and harvesting of the crops and the tracts where they are mainly grown.

### Approximate Date of Publication of Crop Forecasts

Besides the above, periodical estimates or forecasts of principal crops are compiled and issued by the Provincial Governments which are consolidated in the All-India forecasts issued by the Government of India in the Indian Trade Journal. The general practice is to issue a preliminary forecast, a second estimate and a third or final estimate fuller and more precise in data than the first two forecasts. The methods of preparing these forecasts are described in Appendices I and II to the Estimates of Area and Yield of Principal Crops in India referred to above. A list of the dates on or about which the All-India crop-forecasts are issued is given below:—
